Accommodations Tax Committee

Term: 3 years Meeting: Yearly

The Accommodations Tax Committee is comprised of seven volunteer members, the majority of whom are selected from the hospitality industry of the City as well as residents and qualified electors of the municipality. Members are appointed by Council to three year terms.

The ATAX committee responsibilities include:

- study and report to the city council on the impact of tourist activity on municipal services.
- make advisory recommendations to the city council on how to allocate the accommodations tax funds for tourism-related expenditures.

Board of Architectural Review

Term: 4 years Meeting: Monthly, 1st Tuesday; 6pm

The Board of Architecture Review is composed of seven volunteer members appointed by City Council to staggered four year terms. Members of the BAR must be residents of the City. Three members must be professionals in architecture, landscape architecture, horticulture, building construction, engineering, or urban planning. Two members must own property, a business, or be a resident of an architectural review district. One member must be an at-large resident who is not a design professional or an property/business owner or resident of a review district.

The Board of Architectural Review reviews and approves plans for new construction that are situated in one of the City's architectural districts. Specific responsibilities of the BAR include:

- Review new construction within established Architectural Overlay Districts
- Review new construction, exterior renovations, and new signs within the General Commercial District
- Review new construction within other areas as designated by ordinance.
- All changes of use from residential to nonresidential.
- Any alteration or addition that increases the total impervious site area or gross floor area of a building.

Board of Zoning Appeals

Term: 3 years Meeting: Monthly as needed, 3rd Thursday; 6pm

The Board of Zoning Appeals is a quasi-judicial board charged with considering requests regarding changes and exceptions to the City's established zoning ordinance. The Board is comprised of seven volunteer members appointed by City Council to three year terms.

The BZA holds the following powers:

- Considering requests for variances from a specific requirement of the City's zoning ordinance
- Hearing appeals of petitioners seeking review of a decision made by the Zoning and Codes Administrator
- Reviews and approves/disapproves requests for special exceptions. (Special exceptions are uses allowed in specified zoning districts upon determination by the BZA that the proposed location is appropriate. The BZA may impose additional conditions on the special exception if necessary.)

Building and Fire Board of Appeals

Term: 4 years Meeting: As Needed; not regularly scheduled

The Building and Fire Board of Appeals was established in accordance with the International Building Code and the International Fire Code. This Board is composed of no fewer than five volunteer members who must be qualified by experience and training to pass on matters pertaining to building construction or fire codes and may not be employees of the City. One of these members must have a background on fire code matters. These members are appointed by Council for a period of four years.

The Board is a quasi-judicial body charged with hearing appeals of decisions made by the City Building Official to consider requests for variances to specific code requirements imposed by the International Building Code.

Economic Development Advisory Committee

Term: 4 years Meeting: 3rd Thursday February, April, June, August, October, December; 12:30pm

Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee

Term: 3 years Meeting: Quarterly (February, May, August, November), Tuesday; 6pm

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee is a seven member volunteer board appointed by Council to three year terms. This board serves in an advisory role to the Parks and Recreation Director and to City Council.

The responsibilities of the Committee include:

- Review, research as needed, and advise and provide suggestions to the Director of the Parks and Recreation Department and/or to City Council, at least annually, regarding:
- Current events, activities, leagues, lessons, and other program offerings;
- Current facilities, equipment, and supplies;
- Fiscal year-end statistics on the use of facilities and participation in programs;
- Long-range and/or master plans for future Parks and Recreation activities and facilities;
- Other future leisure and recreation activities and programs;
- Continued incorporation of and coordination with other entities and/or City Departments/Boards/Committees in joint programming,
- The Department's proposed fiscal year budget and income projections prior to its submission to Council; and,
- Other matters as approved or assigned by the Director or by City Council.
- Assist and advise staff in identifying potential volunteers, coaches, and sponsors for programs and activities;
- Provide a report of the Committee's activities to Council at least once annually or at any time upon request of Council; and,
- Provide feedback on the performance of the Director to the City Administrator prior to the Director's annual performance evaluation.

Planning Commission

Term: 4 years Meeting: Monthly, 2nd Monday; 6pm

The Planning Commission is a volunteer committee consisting of seven members who are appointed by City Council to a term of four years. The commission was established as an advisory board to accomplish coordinated and harmonious development of the municipality. To that end, the Commission provides recommendations on a variety of land use related issues impacting the long term quality of life in the Clemson community.

The Commission is responsible for:

- Reviewing and directing the preparation of the City's Comprehensive Plan, Zoning Ordinance, and land development regulations
- Approving street name requests
- Providing recommendations of rezoning requests
- Approving land development applications
- Providing recommendations regarding ordinance amendments

Police Advisory Board

Term: 3 years Meeting: Monthly, 4th Thursday; 6pm

The city police department advisory board shall consist of nine members appointed by the city council. Seven members shall serve in an at-large capacity; one member shall serve as a representative of the student body of Clemson University; and one member shall serve as a representative of the student body of Daniel High School.

At-large members of the police department advisory board shall be appointed for a term of three years. Other members shall be appointed for one-year terms. A member may be reappointed for one term. Should a vacancy in office occur, successors shall be appointed for the balance of the unexpired term by the city council. Each member shall hold office for such member's term and until a successor shall have been appointed and qualified. No member of the board shall receive any compensation for service rendered on the committee.

The police department advisory board shall be empowered as follows:

- Serve to facilitate communication between the community and police department.
- Advise the police department regarding issues facing the community.
- Assist the police department in support of grants, strategies, implementation, and monitoring of projects.
- Provide other assistance that the chief of police may request.
- Carry out any other duties prescribed by the city council.

Public Arts and Culture Commission

Term: 3 years Meeting: Monthly, 2nd Tuesday

The City of Clemson Public Arts and Culture Commission consists of seven volunteer members appointed by council to three year terms. One member must be a business owner, one must be representative of The Arts Center, one must be a resident who is a visual or performing artist, and one must be from the arts faculty and/or Brooks Center at Clemson University. The three other members must be residents of the Clemson community at large. (Residency within the City of Clemson is not required for those members who represent a specific appointment from an organization or business.)

The Commission serves as an advocate for the arts and as an advisory body to the Mayor and the City Council. The Commission is responsible for reviewing and directing the development of public art initiatives and for providing visionary leadership in order to advance arts for the City and its citizens. As such, the Commission will make recommendations on a variety of arts and culture issues regarding, but not limited to:

- Policies, priorities, and plans for promoting, advancing, and maintaining public art projects and programs in Clemson;
- Development of an annual arts and cultural calendar for the city, which shall include all relevant events and activities that are hosted by Clemson area art organizations and entities;
- Encouraging the promotion of South Carolina artists in City art projects by setting annual goals to be identified in an arts and cultural plan to be approved by City Council;
- Encouraging citizen input and involvement in the design and selection of artists for public art projects and programs;
- Coordinating with the private sector and other governmental agencies in promoting arts and cultural excellence as a tool for the encouragement of economic development, business relocation and tourism; and
- Organizing and promoting public art projects and programs that celebrate the city and its unique cultural heritage.
